- (c) What does the poem, *Tintern Abbey* tell about Wordsworth's feelings towards his sister and his hopes for her future years?
- (d) Sketch the character of Kubla Khan.
- (e) What is the meaning of the line "That deep-browed Homer ruled as his demesne" in Keats' *On First Looking Into Chapman's Homer*?
- (f) What, according to Keats, comprises the music of Autumn in the poem, *To Autumn*?
- (g) Comment on *Ode to the West Wind* as an ode.
- (h) What discussions influenced the development of Mary Shelley's idea of writing *Frankenstein*?

3. Answer any *four* of the following questions :

- (a) Comment briefly on the speaker's questions to the little lamb in *The Lamb* by William Blake.
- (b) Consider Robert Burns' poem, *Scots Wha Hae* as a patriotic song.
- (c) Critically assess Robert Burns' poem, *A Bard's Epitaph*.
- (d) Give a central idea of Wordsworth's poem, *Composed upon Westminster Bridge*.
- (e) Describe the stately 'Pleasure-dome' built by Kubla Khan.
- (f) What is a conversational poem? Write a short note on *Dejection : An Ode* as a conversation poem.
- (g) Write briefly about Keats' use of personification in *To Autumn*.
- (h) Why is the West Wind called 'destroyer' and 'preserver'? Do a close analysis of the first stanza of the ode.

4. Answer any *four* of the following questions :

- (a) Attempt a critical appreciation of William Blake's poem, *The Tyger*.
- (b) Write an essay on the style and technique of Robert Burns' poetry with reference to the poems prescribed in your course.
- (c) Critically comment on William Wordsworth's attitude to nature as revealed in his poem, *Tintern Abbey*.
- (d) "The nurse who heals in Wordsworth's poetry is not nature ... but memory." Discuss the above statement with reference to the poems in your course.
- (e) Show how Coleridge created a sense of mystery and remoteness through imagery in his poem, *Kubla Khan*.
- (f) Write an essay on the theme of the poem, *Dejection : An Ode*.

- (g) Discuss the theme of hope and regeneration as dealt with in Shelley's poem, *Ode to the West Wind*.
- (h) Keats' *Ode to a Nightingale* explores the tension between the poet's flight of imagination and reality. Discuss.
- (i) Assess *Frankenstein* as a Gothic romance.
- (j) Do you agree that the Monster and not Victor Frankenstein, is the real hero of Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*? Give a reasoned answer.
